Bio for Mary A. Marchant Includes Career Highlights & Diversity Efforts

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Mary Marchant grew up on a family farm in the Central Valley of California and obtained her Ph.D. in agricultural economics from the University of California at Davis, specializing in international trade. Upon graduating, she joined the University of Kentucky faculty, where she worked for 17 years. She joined Virginia Tech as Associate Dean and Director of Academic Programs for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (CALS) and has been a full-time faculty member since 2009.

Her research focuses on U.S.-China agricultural trade. In response to the escalating trade dispute, she has been interviewed and cited by Fox News, CBS Money Report, the Washington Post, WDBJ local news, and numerous agricultural media. In 2019, Marchant was awarded the Agriculture and Applied Economics Association (AAEA) Quality of Communication Award for the co-edited *"U.S.-China Trade Dispute and Potential Impacts on Agriculture" Choices* theme issue:

Marchant has published extensively with nearly 200 journal articles and publications—including over 80 papers in 20 different refereed journals/publications—one sole-authored book and seven edited journal volumes and conference proceedings. Additionally, she has built a research/teaching program funded by more than \$4.5 million in grants and external funding.

Marchant's teaching philosophy seeks to enhance students' academic success and professional development. For undergraduates, this means incorporating classroom activities to meet the skills that employers want—communication and teamwork. For graduate students, this means working with students to publish papers in academic journals and present results at scholarly conferences. She has co-authored with 34 unique students on 47 peer-reviewed publications, including 31 journal articles, and 60+ presentations at professional meetings—international, national and regional, e.g., the Southern Agricultural Economics Association.

Over her 30+ year career, Marchant has taught 16 unique courses at Virginia Tech and the University of Kentucky to nearly 3,000 students.
